<u>REGULAR AGENDA</u>

<u>REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGIES PLAN</u>

Jim Edwards began by bringing greetings from the Isothermal Planning and Development

Commission Board. The Regional Economic Development Strategies Plan is a document that is updated

every few years. This document is used as a gateway for funding from EDA. The Scruggs Center and

the Cleveland Community College Allied Health building have both received funding from EDA in

recent years.

The plan looks at ways to improve the economy. It is completed with the assistance of the

Workforce Development Board. It looks at socioeconomic changes, unemployment, etc.

The process involved engaging many key private and public sector leaders in deciding how best to

address the region's challenges and take advantage of potential regional opportunities. A series of

community meetings were held and the committee received valuable input from Ken Mooney of the

Cleveland County Economic Development Partnership. Upon completing this process, the steering

committee opted to focus on the following five core strategies as follows:

(1) Build a Regional Competitive Advantage and Leverage the Marketplace.

It is easier to navigate downstream than row upstream, so we should build on our strengths and work with the market, not against it.

(2) Establish & Maintain A Robust Regional Infrastructure. To be successful, we need to make sure investments in capital assets will support our communities, now and in the future.

(3) Create Revitalized & Vibrant Communities. Just as a chain is only as strong as its weakest link, great regions make sure that all of their cities, towns, suburbs and rural areas are positioned to succeed.

(4) Develop Healthy and Innovative People In an increasingly competitive and uncertain world, training, developing and educating our citizens will be critically important.

(5) Create or support collaborative networks to sustain regional solutions. *Promote inter-governmental cooperation for regional economic development activities.*

The Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy is one of sixteen being produced across the

state. It has been several years since the State of North Carolina developed a statewide plan. Regional

Councils felt they could help the state by using the same model for the sixteen regions. These sixteen

plans can be combined to complete a statewide document.

<u>PLANNING DEPARTMENT ~ MINIMUM HOUSING CODE VIOLATION ~ 119 E.</u> <u>DOUBLE SHOALS ROAD</u>

A hearing was held on September 26, 2011 regarding eight mobile homes located at 119 E.

Double Shoals Road. The properties are owned by Larry Lail. After the hearing, the owner was allowed 90 days to demolish the eight mobile homes. Bill McCarter, Planning Director, spoke with Mr. Lail. Three of the mobile homes have been demolished by the Fire Department. He was unsure why the remaining five had not demolished.

Bill McCarter, Planning Director, recommended Commissioners adopt an ordinance, authorizing the Code Enforcement Officer to demolish the remaining five mobile homes at 119 East Double Shoals Road.

<u>ACTION:</u> Mary Accor made the motion which was seconded by Jason Falls and unanimously

adopted by the board, *to adopt the following ordinance:*

CLEVELAND COUNTY NORTH CAROLINA

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER TO DEMOLISH FIVE (5) MOBILE HOMES AT 119 EAST DOUBLE SHOALS ROAD

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 160A, Article 19, Part 6 of the North Carolina General Statutes, the mobile homes located at 119 East Double Shoals Road, Units 1,2,3,4, and 15, Cleveland County, North Carolina have been inspected and found to be unfit for human habitation and to otherwise constitute a danger to persons and a threat to the health and welfare of the citizens within Cleveland County; and

WHEREAS, according to the procedures provided by law, the owner(s) of said property have been given notice of the aforesaid inspection, defective conditions, determination and order to bring said property into compliance with the minimum housing code of Cleveland County and the State of North Carolina by appropriate repair and/or demolition of said dilapidated dwelling; and

WHEREAS, the owner(s) have not complied with the Findings and Order by the Code Enforcement Officer within the period allowed by law; and

WHEREAS, the said dwellings remain, at this time, unfit for human habitation, dilapidated, and a danger to the health and safety of the citizens of Cleveland County and should be demolished in order to prevent and alleviate such danger and dilapidated conditions;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CLEVELAND COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS that the dilapidated dwellings located at 119 Double Shoals Road, Units 1,2,3,4,and 15 (Parcel 36556) now or formerly owned by Larry Lail; shall be demolished, and a lien placed against the property for the costs incurred by the county as provided by GS160A-443(6).

Adopted and approved this the 4th day of September 2012 by the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners in open session.

<u>PLANNING DEPARTMENT ~ MINIMUM HOUSING CODE VIOLATION ~ 139</u> <u>WOODBERRY DRIVE</u>

A hearing was held on October 17, 2011 regarding a mobile home located at 139 Woodberry

Drive. The property is owned by David Wayne Allen. During the hearing, the owner was allowed 90

days to demolish the dwelling. At their March 20, 2012 meeting, Bill McCarter brought an ordinance

before Commissioners to demolish the dwelling. Mr. Allen attended the meeting and asked for

additional time to clean up the dwelling. To date, no additional work has been completed.

Bill McCarter, Planning Director, recommended Commissioners adopt an ordinance, authorizing

the Code Enforcement Officer to demolish the dwelling at 139 Woodberry Drive.

ACTION: Mary Accor made the motion which was seconded by Ronnie Hawkins and

unanimously adopted by the board, *to adopt the following ordinance:*

CLEVELAND COUNTY NORTH CAROLINA

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER TO DEMOLISH A MOBILE HOME AT 139 WOODBERRY DRIVE

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 160A, Article 19, Part 6 of the North Carolina General Statutes, the dwelling located at 139 Woodberry Drive, Cleveland County, North Carolina has

been inspected and found to be unfit for human habitation and to otherwise constitute a danger to persons and a threat to the health and welfare of the citizens within Cleveland County; and

WHEREAS, according to the procedures provided by law, the owner(s) of said property have been given notice of the aforesaid inspection, defective conditions, determination and order to bring said property into compliance with the minimum housing code of Cleveland County and the State of North Carolina by appropriate repair and/or demolition of said dilapidated dwelling; and

WHEREAS, the owner(s) have not complied with the Findings and Order by the Code Enforcement Officer within the period allowed by law; and

WHEREAS, the said dwelling remains, at this time, unfit for human habitation, dilapidated, and a danger to the health and safety of the citizens of Cleveland County and should be demolished in order to prevent and alleviate such danger and dilapidated conditions; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CLEVELAND COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS that the dilapidated dwelling located at 139 Woodberry Drive (Parcel 73121) now or formerly owned by David Wayne Allen; shall be demolished, and a lien placed against the property for the costs incurred by the county as provided by GS160A-443(6).

During their March 20, 2012 meeting, Mr. McCarter also presented an ordinance to demolish 153

Woodberry Drive. Again, Mr. Allen asked for additional time to make improvements on the property.

No additional repairs have been made to the property since that meeting.

Bill McCarter, Planning Director, recommended Commissioners adopt an ordinance, authorizing

the Code Enforcement Officer to demolish the dwelling at 153 Woodberry Drive.

ACTION: Mary Accor made the motion which was seconded by Jason Falls and unanimously

adopted by the board, to adopt the following ordinance:

WHEREAS, the owner(s) have not complied with the Findings and Order by the Code Enforcement Officer within the period allowed by law; and

The Farmers Market is within \$75,000 of their fundraising goal. Work will be beginning soon on construction of the Farmers Market. At the CAGO meeting in September, the Farmers Market will be asking CAGO for \$5,000.
